Perspectives on science and other theories

Open Systems Theory (OST) is just a branch or area of science like any other and those who work with OST see themselves as scientists much like any other. As such, most practitioners have a lively interest in science more generally and a scientific approach to matters of interest as they arise.

Indeed as Fred always said when asked what he did or what 'social science' entailed, "anything with people in it". As at one level science is a human activity, i.e. we cannot take the people out of it, perhaps we should regard social science as the whole, of which the other sciences are only parts.
